How Federal Funding Comes to the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Region

State-Level Process

NH Ten-Year Transportation Improvement Program ("Ten-Year Plan")

- Many eligible project types road & bridge improvements; pedestrian & bicycle infrastructure, etc. Federal aideligible roadways and facilities only.*
- 100% project funding, except in urban compact areas (80%).
- New funding round every 2 years.
- New projects typically placed in last 2 years of Ten-Year Plan.
- RPCs submit regional priority projects to NH DOT.

Federal Aid Programs

NH DOT administers multiple federal aid programs:

- Transportation Alternatives
 Program (TAP): pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure improvements.
- Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality (CMAQ): projects that improve air quality (congestion improvements, pedestrian & bicycle projects, etc).
- **Highway Safety Improvement** (**HSIP**): safety improvements in areas with severe crash history.
- Funding amounts, process, and timelines vary by program.

The Ten-Year Plan is a regular funding stream for the region. The UVLSRPC region is typically allocated \$3.8 million every two years. Projects compete within the region for funding.



Programmatic federal aid is <u>not</u> <u>guaranteed</u> for the region.
Municipalities must apply and compete with other proposals statewide.





- Projects solicited from municipalities by UVLSRPC. UVLSRPC can assist with project/proposal development.
- UVLSRPC Transportation Advisory Committee ranks and selects projects based on statewide evaluation criteria.
- Project priorities are based on UVLSRPC Regional Corridor Transportation Plan.
- Ten-Year Plan projects are managed by NH DOT.

Federal Aid Programs

- UVLSRPC is available to provide assistance to municipalities for developing funding proposals.
- UVLSRPC Transportation Advisory
 Committee submits regional project
 rankings to the state for TAP and
 CMAQ; rankings are based on
 UVLSRPC Regional Corridor
 Transportation Plan. The state makes
 makes final funding decisions.
- TAP and CMAQ projects are managed locally by municipalities. Municipalities are reimbursed up to 80% of costs.
